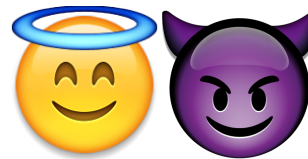
How is this headline intended to make the reader *feel*? Choose a colour to represent this emotion.

I feel that the colour red could be used to represent this headline. This is because I think it is intended to provoke fear and anger in those who read it. The use of the phrase “cavalier crims” could cause people to think that they are at risk of attack in broad daylight, especially considering the first part of the headline, which reads “next-gen fear”. This conveys the idea that young people pose a risk to ‘good’, average citizens.

The first part of this headline refers to “next-gen fear”. This conveys that older people should fear young people because of their “cavalier”, which means offhand or unconcerned, attitude to committing crime. The “cops”, who are “shocked” by this crime, are portrayed as the ‘good guys’ when contrasted with the “young crims”. This makes me think of the idea of good versus evil, which is why I chose the halo emoji and the smiling devil emoji.

I chose an image that shows a young person using a baseball bat to attack someone coming out of an expensive looking car. I feel this image could accompany this headline as the “young crim” is targeting someone older than him, which could give the older person reason to feel “next-gen fear”. The crime is occurring during the day, which might indicate that the criminal doesn’t care about getting caught, or is “cavalier”.
